
Student Safety-Student Drop-off

As we all know, the safety of our students is our top priority. With that in mind, we would like to remind all parents and guardians about the importance of driving carefully during student drop-off and pick-up times.



The school drop-off and pick-up zones (see below) can be bustling with activity, with students crossing the road and parents maneuvering their vehicles in limited space. To ensure the safety of everyone in our school community, please consider the following guidelines:

- Obey Traffic Rules: Follow all traffic rules and regulations, including speed limits, no-parking zones, and designated pick-up/drop-off areas. Be mindful of crosswalks and pedestrian areas.
- Familiarize yourself with and adhere to the school's drop-off and pick-up procedures. These guidelines are in place to streamline traffic flow and enhance safety.



- Avoid Distractions: Put away your mobile phones and other distractions while driving through the school zone. This helps maintain focus on the road and the students in the vicinity.
- Be Patient: During busy drop-off and pick-up times, patience is key. Take your time, maintain a safe following distance, and be considerate of others.
- Watch for Pedestrians: Be vigilant for students crossing the road. Always yield the right of way to pedestrians, and be prepared to stop when necessary.

Health and Wellness-Concussions



Concussions can occur during sports or any time there is direct contact with the head or from an injury to another part of the body with enough force to shake the head. It is important for you as parents to inform coaches, nurses and teachers whenever your child experiences an injury, either directly or indirectly, involving the head, even if it seems minor, because it could lead to a concussion. Concussion symptoms are not always present immediately after an injury occurs. Swelling or a bleed inside the skull may not cause symptoms initially if it is minimal but as swelling worsens or bleeding accumulates (hematoma) inside the skull it createsmore pressure inside the head and signs and symptoms become more evident.

Signs and symptoms to look for after a head injury include: Dizziness, the individual appears spaced out, confusion, forgetfulness, clumsy or awkward movements, delayed or inappropriate responses when spoken to, slurred speech, changes in behavior or personality, memory loss, seizures, unconsciousness, headache, nausea and/or vomiting, difficulty standing or walking, blurred or double vision, noise and/or light sensitivity, drowsiness, difficult to arouse, difficulty sleeping, difficulties with concentration, report the they "don't feel right," nervousness, agitation, irritability, feeling more emotional. These signs and symptoms warrant immediate evaluation by a trained medical professional.




Coaches and/or athletic trainers will provide players and their parents with concussion paperwork when a concussion is suspected during sports. Attached are the <u>forms</u> for a medical provider to complete when your child is evaluated for a concussion. Even if your child's head injury is not related to sports or occurs outside of school you can still use these forms. We want to keep your child safe from reinjury and do not want them to become overwhelmed with school work until they are deemed ready to return to full participation by a physician. Often recommendations include a gradual return to activity and academics. Only a trained physician is qualified to make the appropriate recommendations for your child to return to physical activity and learning. Therefore, it is very important that the school receives these forms completed by the doctor so that staff are informed of the appropriate accommodations needed for your child's physical activity level and academics.

What is your most memorable student support experience?

Student Highlight | Madera FFA Members Selected As Regional Stars

Two Madera FFA members were selected to represent the San Joaquin FFA Region in the State Star awards this spring. The State Star Award recognizes students who have excellent Supervised Agricultural Experience Projects in one of four areas; Farmer, Placement, Agriscience, and Agribusiness. Members complete an application and record book detailing their SAE projects at the sectional and regional level. If they are chosen at the regional level they compete as one of the six regional representatives. The members interview with industry professionals and the California State FFA Officers in the spring with the winners announced on stage at the California FFA State Convention.



William Thompson was selected as the region's Star in Agribusiness. The Star in Agribusiness award recognizes students who have developed a business that is related to agriculture but not involved in the production of any commodities. Will's project is WillBilly's Landscape, a project he started when he was younger as a way to help pay for his Little League expenses. Will continued to develop his project throughout high school, having a customer base of 28 and specializing in acreage maintenance as well as landscape installments. Will was named the 2023 California State Proficiency Award Winner in Turfgrass for his SAE and will be competing again in the area of Diversified Horticulture and Landscaping.

Morelia Vieyra Santana will be representing the region in the Star Placement Area. The Star in Placement award recognizes students who work in an agriculture business. Morelia works at Allegre Stables where she helps to start young horses in their groundwork and prepare them to saddle broke.



Morelia's passion for horses and the horse industry started at a young age and led to her involvement in the stables. Morelia was named the 2023 National Proficiency Winner in the Equine Science Placement area in October.
