### **Health and Wellness**

Medication At School

Any medication needed during school hours or during school sponsored activities or events requires a written order from a physician and written consent from the parent/guardian in order to administer such medication(s). This also includes non-prescription medication such as pain relievers (Ibuprofen/Tylenol), cough drops and eye drops.

A parent/guardian or other adult must deliver the medication to the school health office where health office staff will check the medication(s) against the physician order. The amount of medication delivered will then be verified and recorded and signed off by both parties. In order for a student to carry and self- administer an Epipen, inhaler or any other medication this must be explicitly stated in the physician order. Except for inhalers, students may only carry one-day's dosage of medication.

Each medication must be in a separate container labeled by a pharmacist licensed in the United States. This applies to non-prescription medication as well.

No more than a 30-day supply of medication will be accepted.





The Medication At School Authorization Form can be found on the MUSD website or obtained from the school nurse. A new order for medication at school must be provided each school year or sooner if there are any changes in medication, dosage, frequency of medication or reason for administration.

For field trips and other off-campus activities please provide physician orders and medication at least 3 school days prior to the trip/activity so that medication and orders can be processed and the necessary school staff attending the trip or event can be trained on medication administration.

All medication should be picked up by the parent/guardian or other adult at the end of the school year. Any medication not picked up will be discarded.
